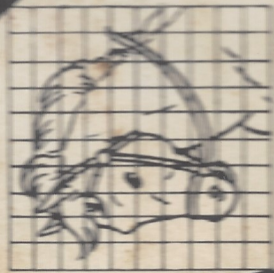
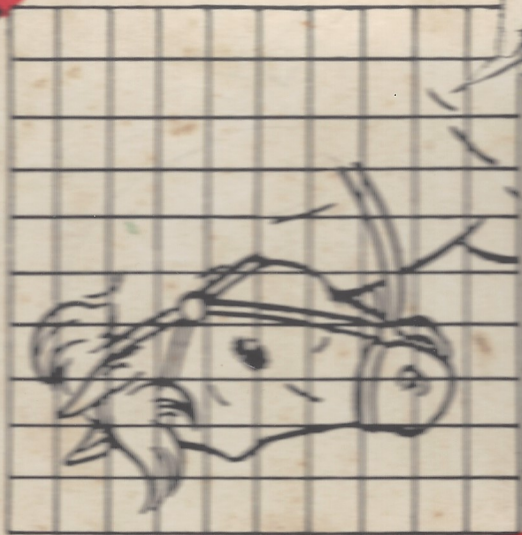

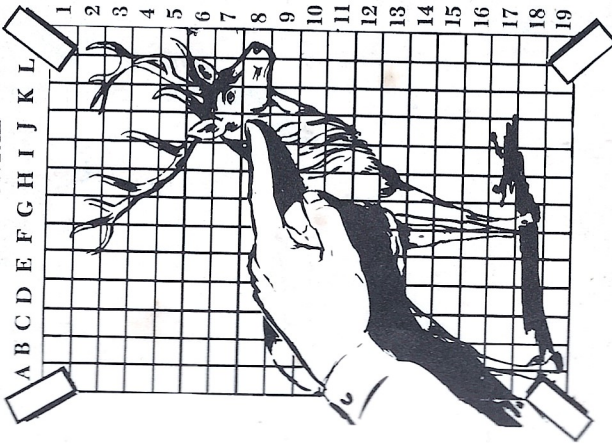

# It's Easy! It's Fun!

**HERE'S HOW TO DRAW  
with DRAW-MASTER**



HORIZONTAL



Do you want to know an EASY way to draw? Just watch these simple steps . . . and before you know it you'll be drawing birds, animals, flowers . . . and even pictures of your parents, your friends, cowboys and so many other things.

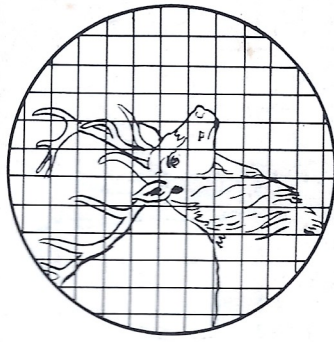
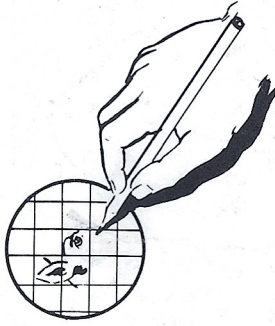
Here is how to start. Look throughout this Draw - Master book and select a subject. Just to prove that it's easy and fun to draw any picture . . . even the hard ones . . . We can start with the drawing of the elk.

First lay your celluloid plastic "Viewer" over the top of the drawing you want to copy. Fasten it to the drawing in your book by placing small pieces of adhesive tape in the corners, to make sure that it will not slip out of position until you are finished.

Next place a thin white piece of paper over the top of any one of the three Draw-Master charts (large, small or medium). Be sure that the paper you use is thin enough to be able to see the black ruled lines underneath

faintly. Fasten this sheet of thin paper to the top of your table with small pieces of adhesive tape in the corners to keep it from slipping while you are drawing.

Remember this . . . it's just like building a brick house . . . you must build the wall one brick at a time . . . and that's exactly what you're going to do here. You are going to BUILD your drawing ONE SQUARE AT A TIME. It's so easy that way!



Now where do you want to start? A good place is the eye . . . so point to the square which contains the eye of the elk on the Draw-Master viewer. Let us suppose that it is located in square "K-7" (the vertical row 7 and the horizontal row K meet in this square).

**DON'T WORRY ABOUT ANY OTHER LINES ON THE ORIGINAL DRAWING BUT THOSE INSIDE THE ONE SQUARE.** Notice the position of the eye, eyebrow and shadow inside this one square. Now as soon as you draw these lines you can move over to the left and start drawing the bottom part of the ear . . . and then move to the square up above and draw the top part of the ear. Your drawing grows . . . one square at a time . . . until the whole thing is complete. Isn't that an easy way to build a drawing?



When your drawing is finished you remove the paper and you can be proud of the beautiful picture without any visible guide lines or squares to mar its beauty.

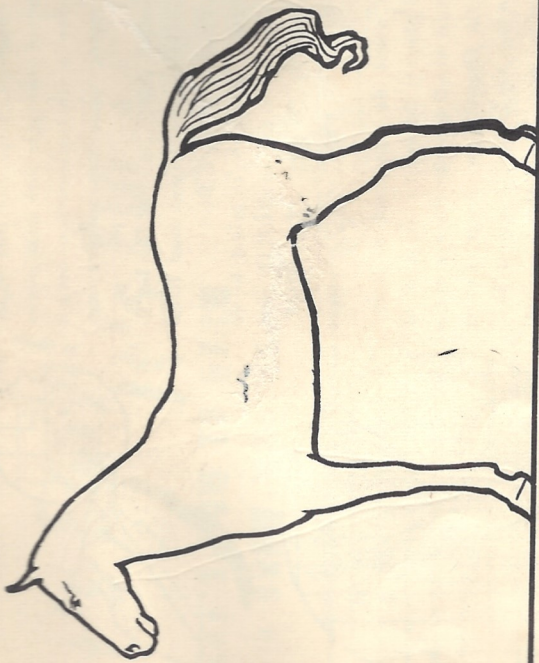

Horse

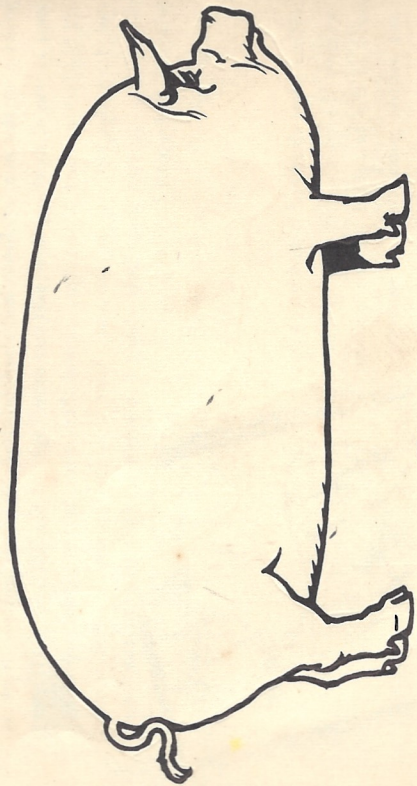

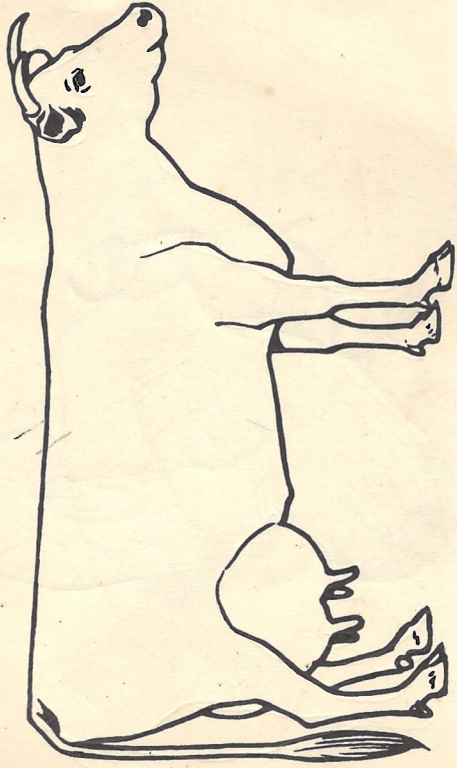

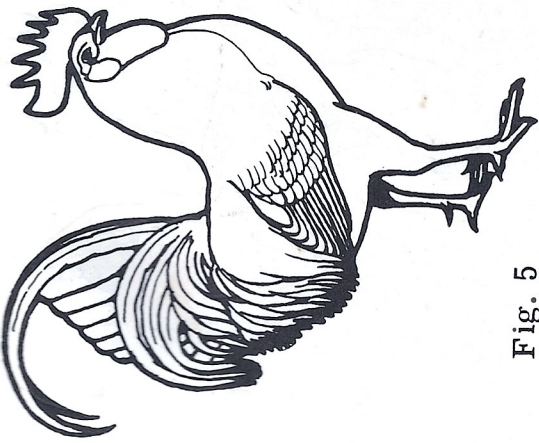

Rooster

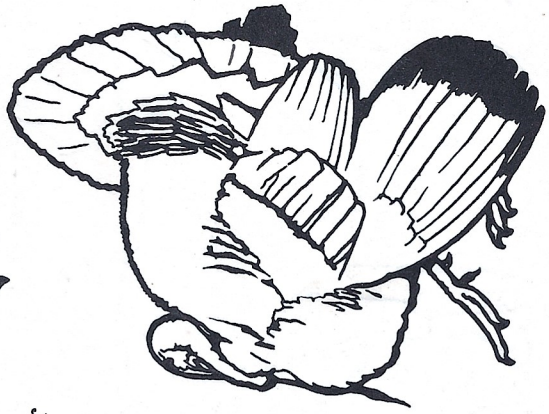

Turkey-gobbler

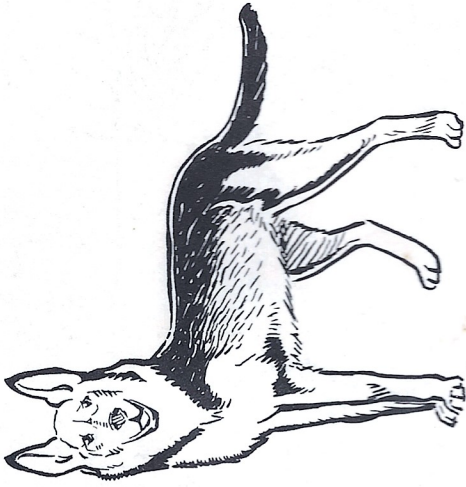

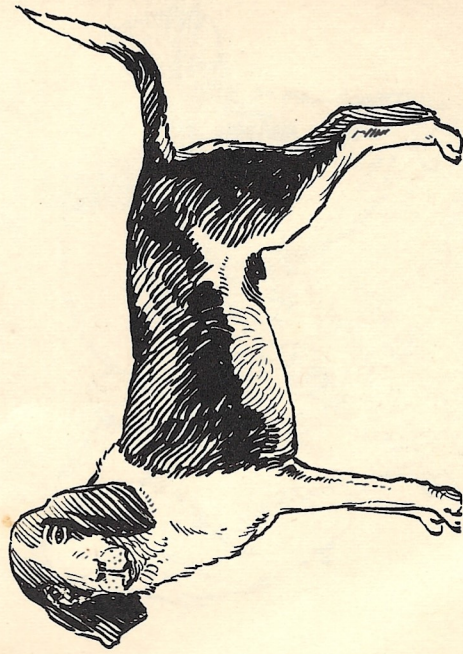

Fox Hound

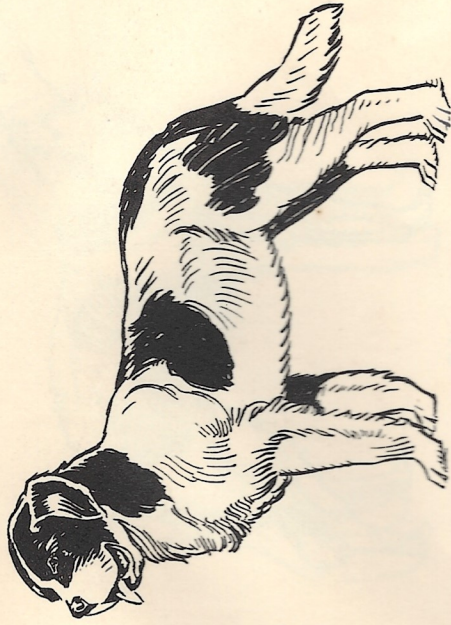

Newfoundland

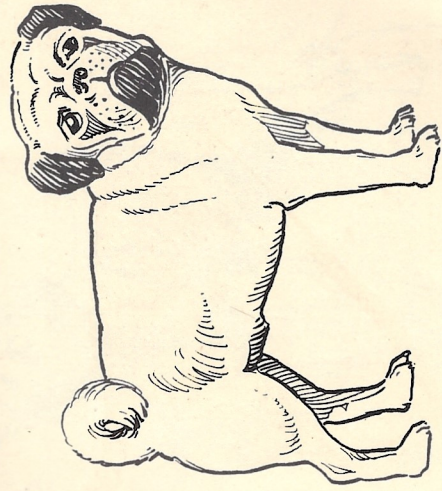

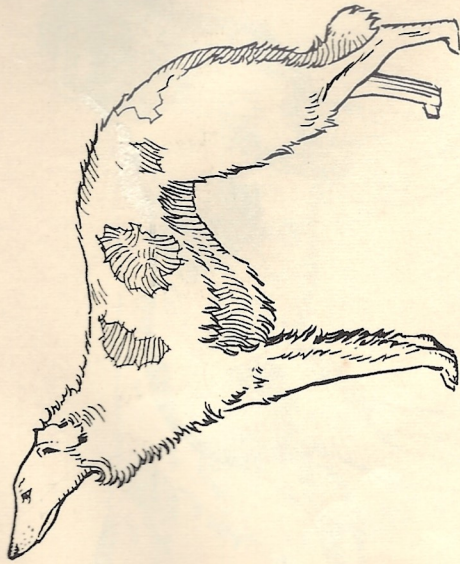

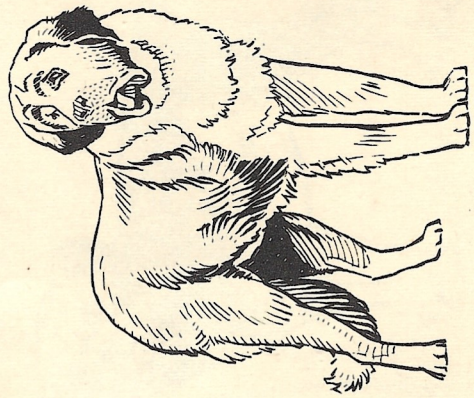

Saint Bernard

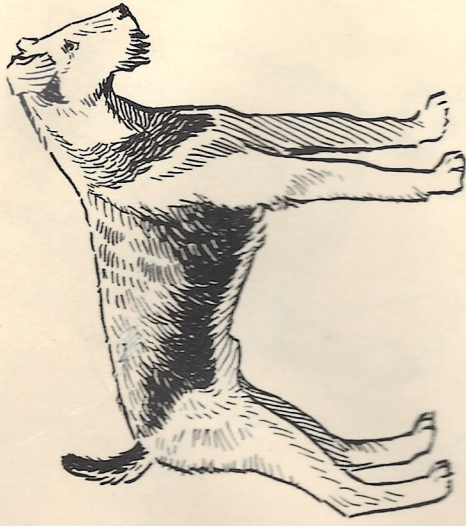

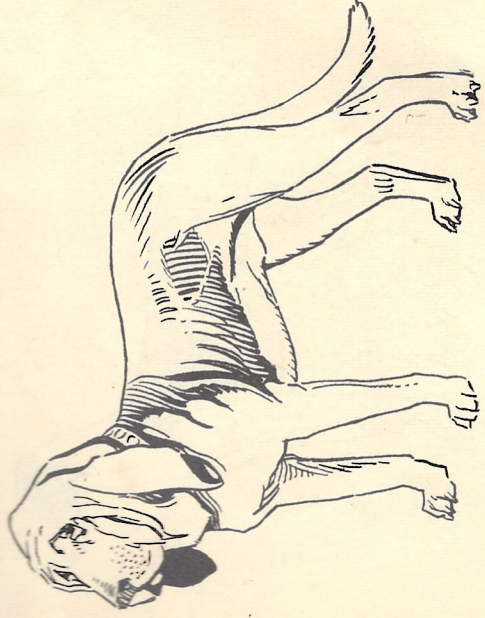

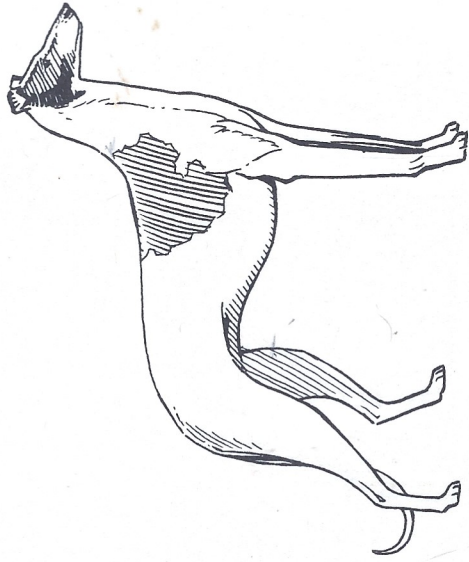

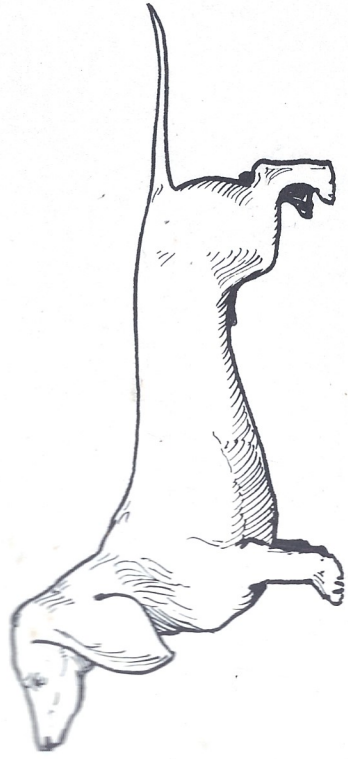

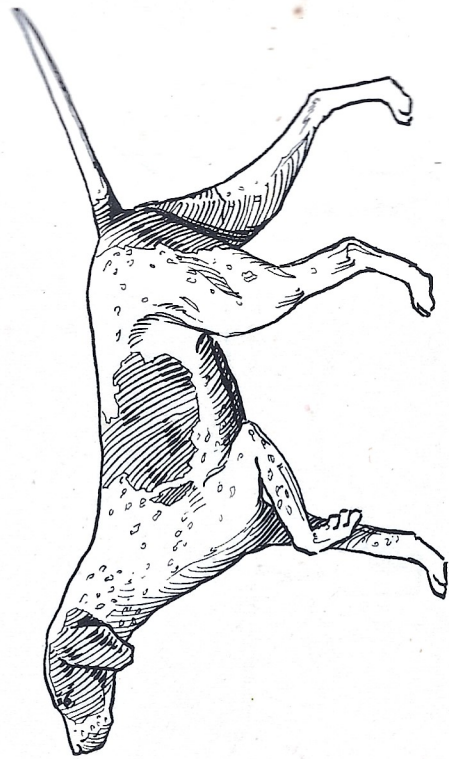

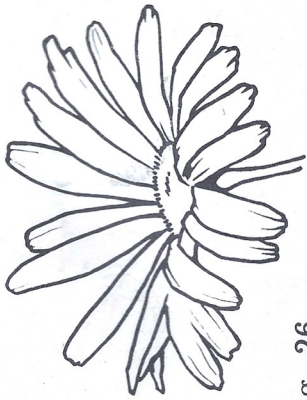

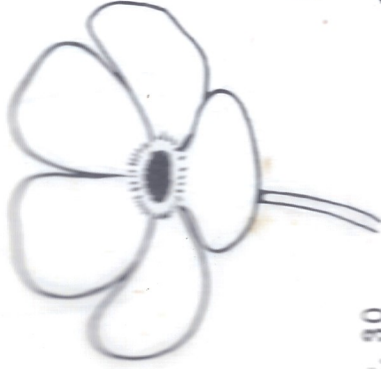

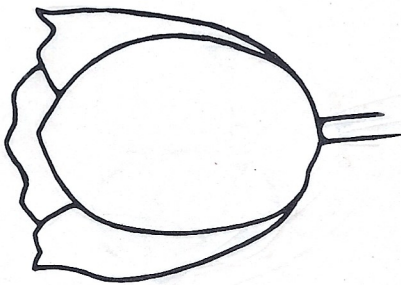

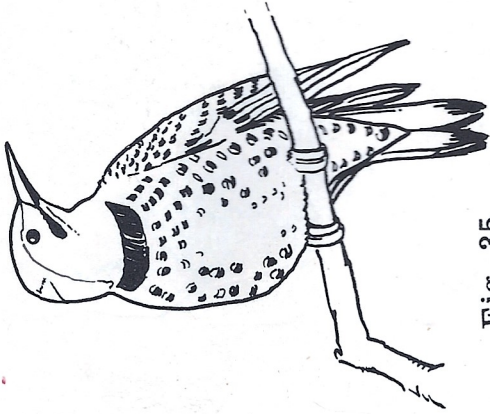

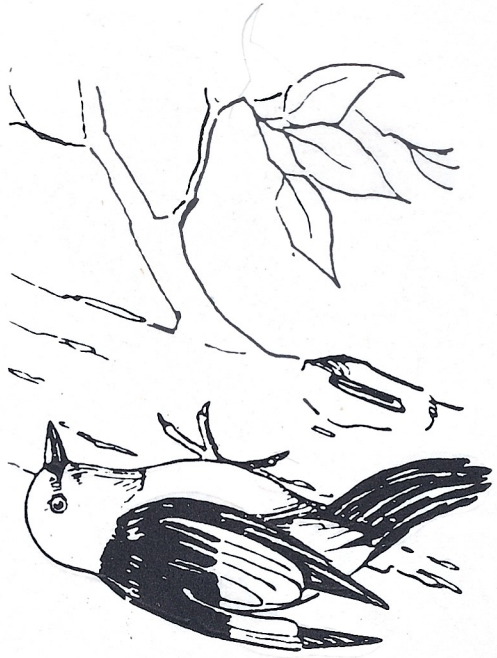

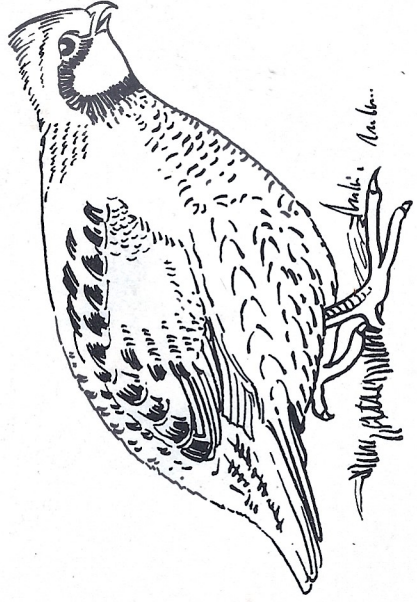

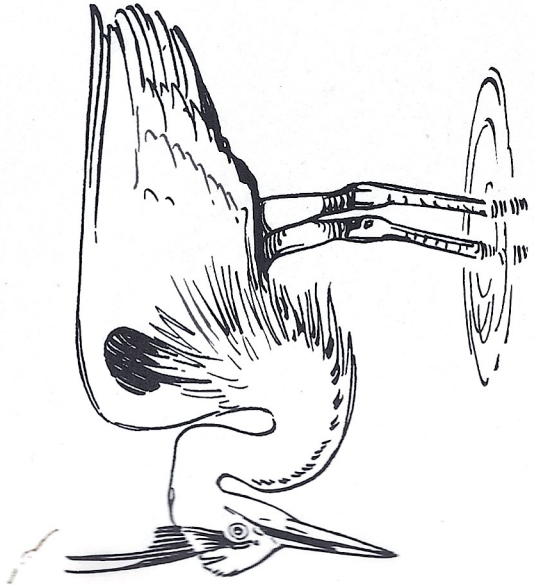

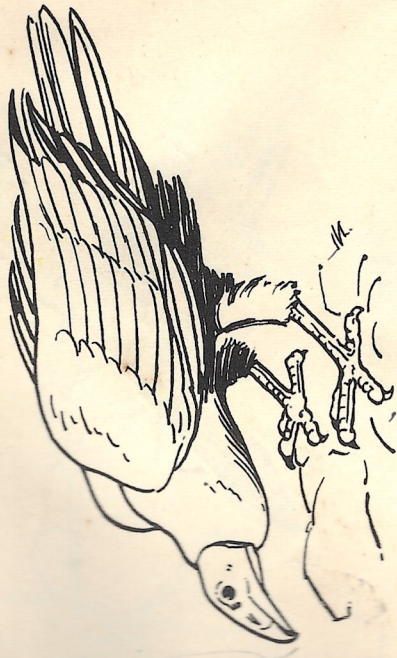

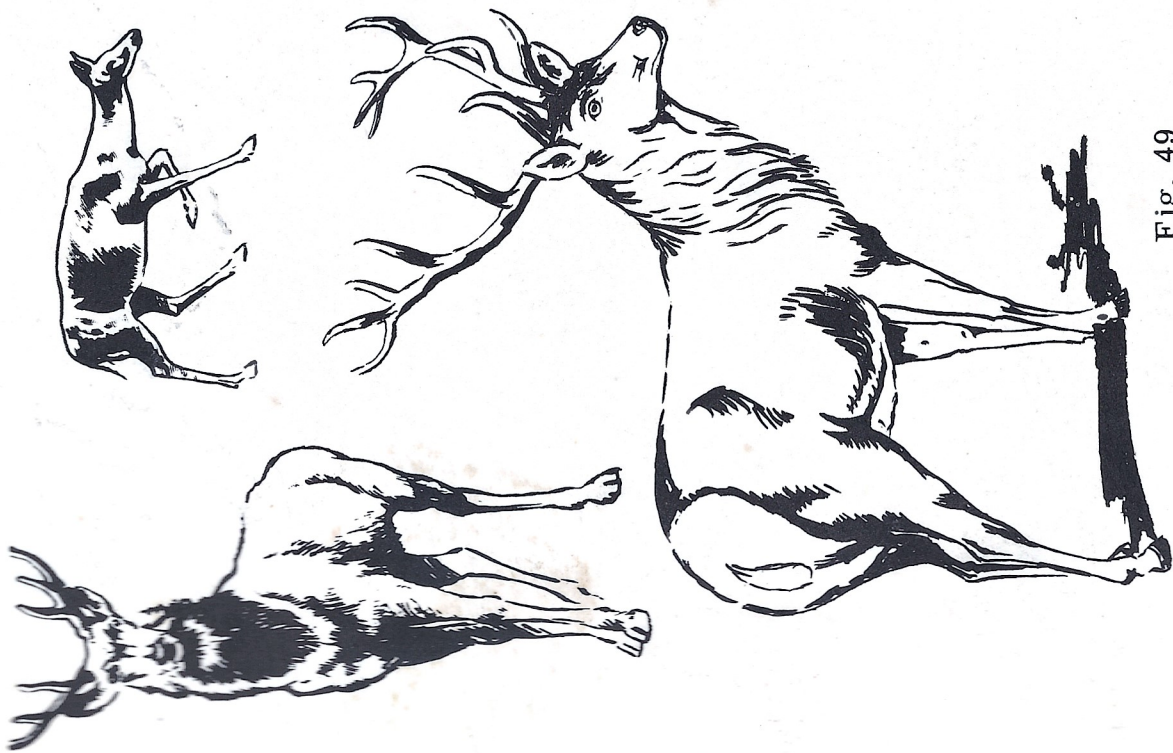

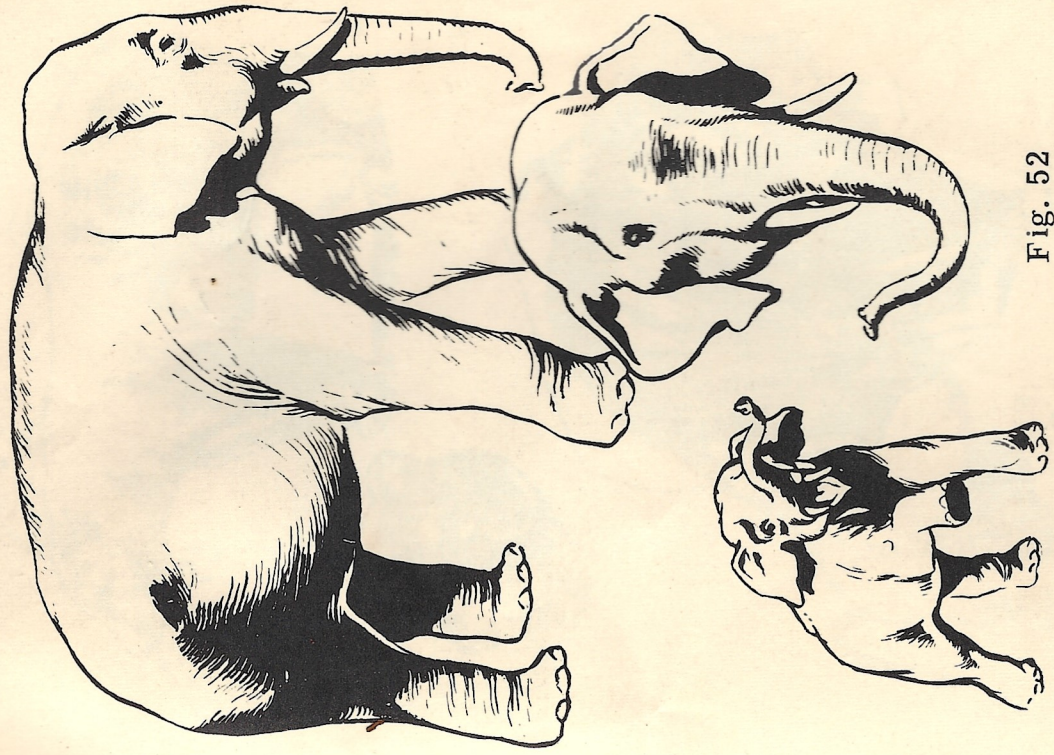

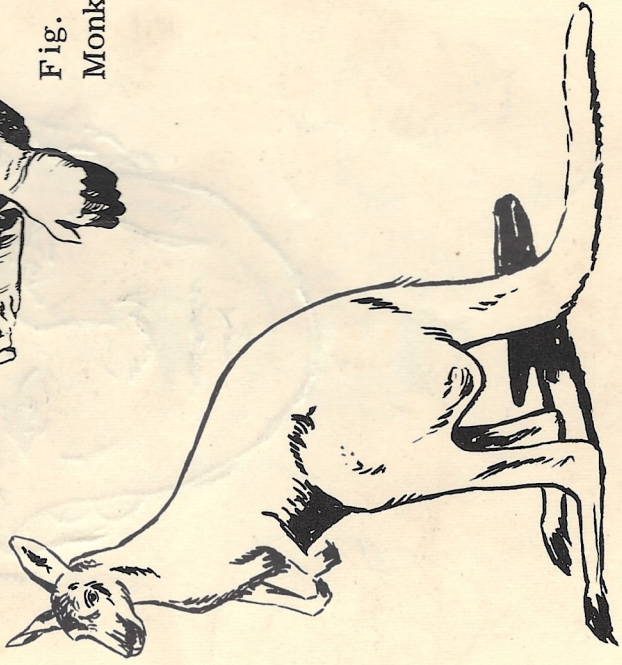

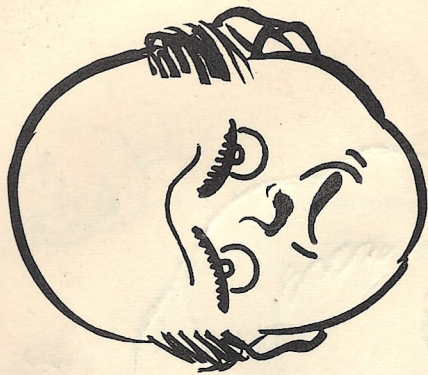

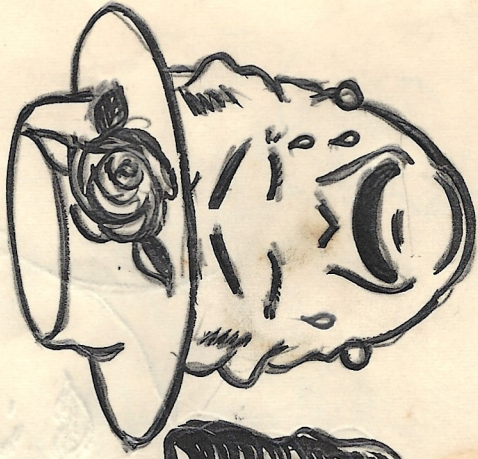

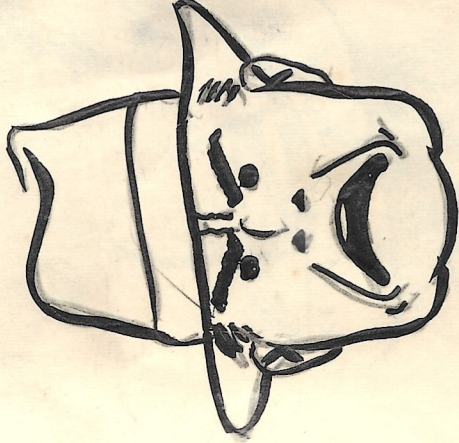

Christmas Symbols

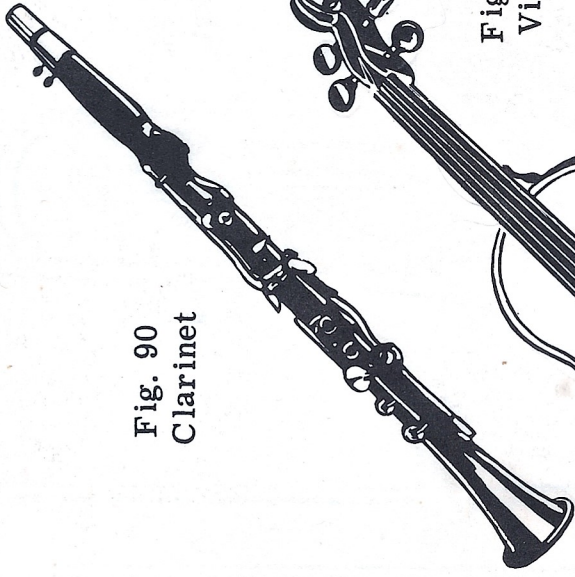

Clarinet

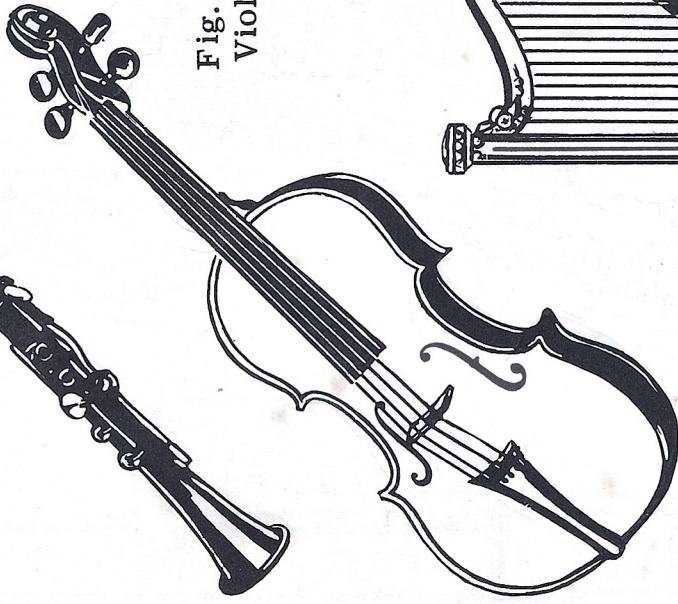

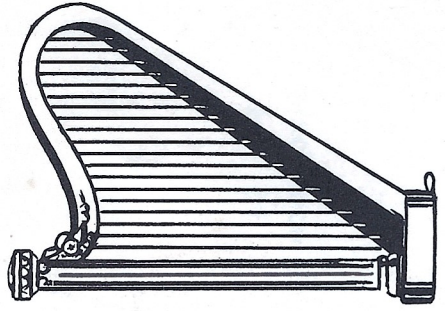
